The family was sponsored under the <u>Blended Visa Office Referred (BVOR)</u> program, which matches travel-ready refugees with sponsors. The program, which started in 2012, splits the cost of settlement between private sponsors and the federal government.

Re: SAHS CAP Spaces for 2018

As we approach 2019, many of you have been asking how long you have before you lose your allocated CAP spaces

Our Answer

- * 2018 cap spaces are valid only until December 31, 2018.
- * Unused spaces cannot be carried over into 2019, and any new or resubmitted applications received by IRCC after December 31, 2018, will be returned to you, unprocessed.

An application is considered received by IRCC if it is <u>postmarked by December 31</u> or <u>emailed prior to midnight local time</u>.

Joint Assistance Sponsorship (JAS)

Refugees sponsored under the **Joint Assistance Sponsorship (JAS)** program have special or enhanced needs that will likely result in a longer or more difficult period of integration in Canada, due to:

- Trauma from violence or torture;
- Medical disabilities;
- Effects of systemic discrimination; or,
- Large family units (such as a single parent with several children).

Under the JAS program, the government and private sponsors support refugees for up to 24 months, depending on the needs of the resettled refugee. In a few cases, the private sponsor may support refugees for up to 36 months. These refugees receive income support from the Government of Canada. They are matched with a private sponsorship group to help them adjust to life in Canada through settlement and emotional support.

Some refugees are identified overseas for the JAS program due to special needs. Others are converted into JAS cases after they arrive in Canada, if they need more support.

JAS refugee profiles can only be picked up by SAHs and their constituent groups.

Family composition: This 38 year old single mother from Eritrea arrived in Canada with her five young children in March 2018.

Background: The mother is illiterate but attends English classes while taking care of her family. The children are enrolled in school. Their mother goes to parenting and behavioural support classes. The family has been matched with a volunteer with extensive experience working with newcomers.

Special needs: The mother struggles to raise five children on her own in an unfamiliar environment. This has slowed her settlement process. One child has a heart condition, two others suffer from developmental delays and disabilities, and the remaining two are being assessed for developmental delays. The child with a heart condition requires a specialist's regular medical attention. The mother experienced trauma while living in a refugee camp in Ethiopia. This affects her parenting and other life skills.

Support needed: She needs help keeping medical appointments and maintaining her English studies. She would benefit from learning to juggle her many responsibilities. She needs support with life skills, such as general hygiene in her home and understanding finances, and with parenting skills.
